Year level: 2

Title: You're the voice artwork

Duration: 60 minutes

Lesson Objectives:

- Students use previous knowledge to reflect and create a meaningful road safety message
- Students construct a road safety message using different materials
- Students explain the reasoning behind their road safety message

Materials / Equipment:

- Paper plate (one per student)
- Art materials e.g. pencils, paint, coloured paper, magazine cut outs, recycled materials etc.
- Road safety message template



Time	Content
5mins	<p>Introduction: <i>We have been learning how to stay safe around our roads. Today we are going to pass on what we have learnt, as a road safety message to everyone who visits our classroom. Who can think of some of the road safety messages that we have learnt? (The teacher writes the students ideas on the board).</i> Below are examples of road safety messages that students could use:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - In an emergency call 000 - Call 000 if someone needs the police, fire or ambulance services - Stop, Look, Listen and Think before crossing the road - Use the safety door when exiting a car - All passengers in the car should wear a seatbelt - Back seat is best, if you're in Primary School <p>The RAC Workshop also includes the following messages:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - When walking always wear bright clothing - Always wear a helmet when riding a bike - Pay attention when riding or walking around the roads - Use a pedestrian crossing when walking across the road - Never cross the road on a bend <p>The road safety messages that the students create can form a classroom Road Safety Board which can display the key messages students have learnt throughout the safety topic.</p>
15mins	<p>Activity 1: Create your face</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Give students a paper plate to design their face. 2. Using a pencil, students draw an outline of their face on the paper plate. 3. Using different textures from a range of art material, students are to create their face. 4. Set aside to dry.
33mins	<p>Activity 2: Create your road safety message</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Students are to select one safety message from the board or one message they have thought up themselves. 2. Using the template, students are to write their road safety message and include a picture. 3. If students finish their work early assign them the task of creating a road picture using a range of textiles. Some road pictures could include a zebra crossing, stop lights, bicycle helmet, stop, look, listen and think sign, seatbelt, footpath, road, car, bike etc. 4. These pictures will help decorate the road safety message board.

2mins	<p>Activity 3: Hanging your Artwork</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Students are to hang their artwork and road safety message on the classroom display board. <p>If time permits, students are to share their safety message to the rest of the class and express why they chose that particular message.</p> <p>Conclusion: <i>Today we have created some fabulous road safety messages. It is important to be safe around our roads. What could happen if we are unsafe?</i></p> <p><i>Sometimes adults even need to be reminded of how to be safe round the roads, so be sure to speak up if you think they are being unsafe around our roads.</i></p> <p>The RAC Community Education team would love to see your completed Road Safety Board.
