List these two licence types below:


Automatic Car C-A

Maximum speed limits are determined by the type of vehicle in use and the different types of roads.

4. How many hours do you need to log in WA to complete your learner's permit?


50 hours in total – 25 hours in phase 1 and 25 hours in phase 2.

Changing lanes	Complete a 3-point turn	Spot and handle hazards
Make safe decisions	Parallel park	Use mirrors and check blind

15. Vehicle distance

It is important to travel a safe distance behind the vehicle in front of you.

Using the following words, fill in the blank spaces below to finish each statement about safe distances:

WORD BANK

One	Two	Sign post	Stationery
Two	Two	Object	Tree

When driving on the freeway, you should have two seconds between your car and the one in front of you. To count the distance, wait for the car in front of you to pass a stationery object like a tree or a sign post. Once the vehicle is in front passes the object you should count one thousand, two thousand. At two thousand your car should be passing the same object.

16. Final points
